2023 Annual Outage Report

Annually, Butler Public Power District compiles all of the system outages for the year and puts together the annual outage report. The annual outage report for 2023 was one of the best in recent history. Mother Nature, most of the time, is a driver for outages through the year. I believe one of the reasons for our great results in 2023 was that our area was in a drought for the second year. We didn't have the lines of thunderstorms roll through our service territory as we

have had in years past. Once in a while, either in late fall or early spring, we can encounter ice on the lines and wind that causes galloping and most likely ends up in an ice storm with lots of outages. In 2023, the service territory stayed clear of any icing events.


With our low number of outages in 2023, we also have to give a lot of credit to our line crews that perform maintenance on our overhead lines. Crews perform line patrol on almost a daily basis. Even though our crews have jobs to build or rebuild services, as they are driving up and down roads they are always keeping an eye out for problems that could cause a power outage. Whether it's making repairs on a pole, stopping and spraying small trees under the line or stopping and trimming a tree burning in the lines, this all helps prevent outages for our customers.

For many years now, the district has had our own tree crew. Our crew cuts and trims trees on almost a daily basis. Over the years we have also upgraded our equipment for the tree crew to try and make their daily tasks safer and simpler. We have purchased a skid loader that we can mount a tree grinding attachment to. We upgraded our wood-chipper, that has a winch to drag limbs to the chipper. We utilize skid loaders to lift and move large limbs that are cleared under and around the power lines. This district crew is also asked from time to time to help build and rebuild services which bring me to my final topic. Several years ago, the Board of Directors approved the Operations Department hiring a tree contractor to help with tree clearing. When you have 1,700 miles of line, there are lots of trees that

need to be cut or trimmed. Having an extra contract crew trimming and removing trees across our service territory has been a game changer for the district.

These are some of the reasons behind one of the best annual outage reports in many, many years! I want to thank our line crews again for all the work that they do to help Butler Public Power District provide safe, low cost and reliable electric service to our customers!

- Safety goggles keep debris out of a lineworker's eyes while they work.
- Rubber gloves are insulated and protect lineworkers from electric shock.
- Steel toe **boots** provide extra protection when lineworkers lift heavy objects.

- Lineworkers wear a safety harness to prevent falls while climbing poles or working in a bucket.
- Lineworkers use a **hot stick**, an insulated tool made from fiberglass, when working on energized lines.
